Message from the Chair



The Foundation had a stellar year in 2016. Total fundraising reached an impressive \$2.5 million giving the Foundation total equity of \$27 million. Underpinning this fundraising performance was the largest number of donations ever received by the Foundation in any year (1273) and the most successful annual appeal in the history of the Foundation.

The Foundation exists to provide support for the University's activities. Based on the strong performance of its investments and current year fundraising it was able to provide a record \$3.1 million in disbursements to research, scholarship and capital projects during the year.

The largest of these was to Wildbase Hospital; completed at the end of 2016 thanks to a \$1.44 million gift from the Foundation. The building was opened in early 2017 by new Vice-Chancellor Professor Jan Thomas. Professor Thomas was welcomed to the Foundation board as an ex-officio member in January. The board is looking forward to working with Professor Thomas to extend and grow the Foundation's activities to support research and teaching and in its important role of providing financial strength and stability to the University.

As central government funding as a proportion of total expenditure declines, the role of university foundations grows in significance. Universities across the world are focusing on engagement with the philanthropic community to support excellence through scholarship, research, building and teaching. Our Foundation is no exception and without its support many worthy students, teachers and projects at Massey would remain unfunded. The Foundation Board has ambitions to significantly increase our fundraising and the level of our endowment funds in support of Massey's strategic goals.

The Foundation has a very positive partnership relationship with the University. The University invests in the Foundation's fundraising activities. Additional investment from the University in 2016 enabled the Foundation to increase the fundraising team numbers from five to seven and to invest in raising its profile with additional bequest advertising as well as adding a telephone campaign to its existing annual alumni appeal. This extra investment certainly paid dividends.

My sincere thanks to retiring board members Brian Ward and John Harrison, both of them had reached the end of their maximum eight-year tenure, outgoing Vice-Chancellor Steve Maharey, who completed his time with Massey University in December, and current board members Dianne Kidd, Bryan Mogridge and Tony Ryall, who provide a highly experienced governance team with a wealth of knowledge across all sectors. Finally, I must thank the hard-working Foundation team under the very able leadership of director Mitch Murdoch.

Student callers support Refectory



In 2016 the Foundation embarked on the ambitious task of raising \$70,000 from the Massey alumni community to help fund student scholarships and the restoration of the Refectory building on the Manawatū campus.

Having run alumni appeals every year since 2009 using post and email, the Foundation decided to do things a bit differently this time around by organising a student-run "Phonathon".

The Foundation partnered with a United States-based fundraising consultancy to deliver its first phone appeal, run over four weeks in November and December. Supported by postal and email campaigns, the appeal reached out to more than 84,000 Massey alumni around the world.

The new approach proved successful, resulting in 855 new donors to the Foundation and helping to raise more than \$100,000, making this our most successful alumni appeal.

A team of 27 dedicated Massey students was hired to carry out the pilot phone appeal. The students, from a variety of study programmes, worked in our make-shift call centre in Tiritea House at the Manawatū campus. They called former students throughout the world to reconnect them with the University, talk about the appeal and find out where their lives had taken them.

Feedback from the student callers was that they loved working with the Foundation, describing the appeal work as interesting and rewarding. The students genuinely enjoyed chatting to alumni who had some great stories to share about their time at Massey and they were constantly inspired by their generosity.

Foundation director Mitch Murdoch was impressed with the students' enthusiasm and professionalism.

"The energy from the students over those four weeks was infectious and they were so excited every time they spoke to an inspiring alumnus or alumna or received a donation pledge. We couldn't have asked for a better group of student callers for our first phone appeal."

Ms Murdoch says the feedback from alumni had been positive too.

"They really enjoyed hearing from a young student and being able to reminisce about their time at Massey. It was great for the students to see how passionate and proud our alumni are."

During the phone calls, students asked alumni what advice they would give to current first-year students. A selection of the 2000 pieces of advice collected during the appeal was featured on decks of playing cards distributed to students during Orientation Week on the three campuses in February. The cards received a remarkable response, with student associations distributing more than 4000 of them to mainly first-year students.

Lasting legacy for Massey alumnus

Mr Blake completed his Diploma in Agriculture at Massey in 1952 and was a founding member of Massey's Alumni organisation and a member of the Massey Council for three years. Mrs Blake's generous donation will serve as a lasting tribute to her late husband's lifelong relationship with Massey.

Palmerston North Council backs Refectory project

The Palmerston North City Council kicked off the Foundation's 2016 annual appeal with a \$150,000 donation towards the restoration of the Refectory building. City Mayor Grant Smith says the refurbished Refectory will be an iconic asset, not only for the university but for the city and wider region, and will become part of the Palmerston North City Heritage Trail.

"It's important that Palmerston North City and the University grow closer together," he said. "They have always been close; the city donated some of the land the campus is on and the University donated to the city for the restoration of the Regent on Broadway Theatre."

During the annual appeal Mr Smith visited the Manawātū campus to meet some of the students who were working on the fundraising.

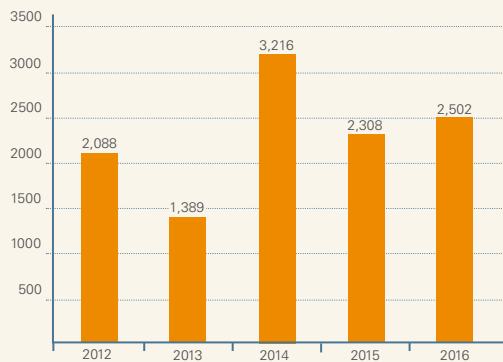
Financial Summary

The Foundation made steady gains in 2016, with fundraising of \$2.5 million and, despite distributions of an impressive \$3.1 million, the Foundation's total equity rose slightly to reach \$26.9 million.

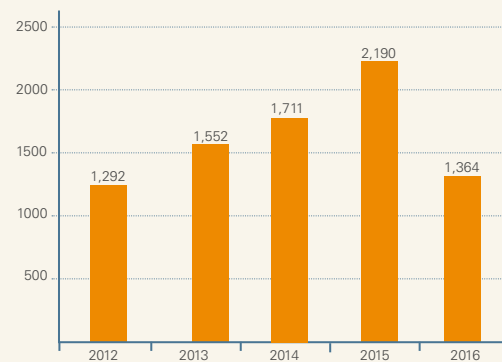
It was a turbulent year for the financial markets, punctuated by two major external events - the US presidential election and Britain's referendum decision to leave the European Union - but despite these factors the Foundation's invested fund performed steadily making an overall gain of 4.3 per cent after fees.

While this income is lower than the extraordinary performance of the preceding years it was a solid performance under taxing market conditions. Total investment income, including interest payments from the Foundation's current use investment pool (CUIP) and before fees, was \$1,364,000.

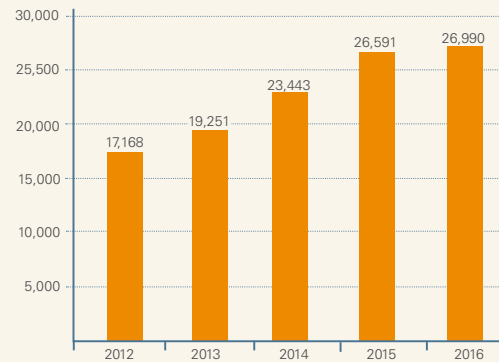
FUNDRAISING INCOME (\$000)



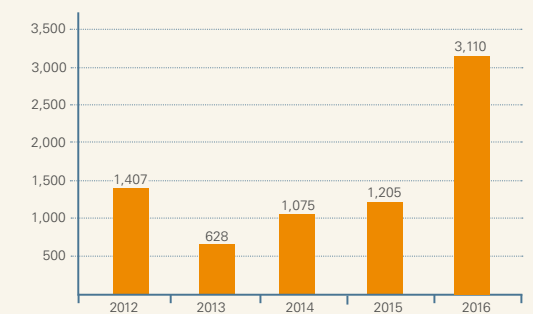
INVESTMENT INCOME (\$000)



TOTAL EQUITY (\$000)



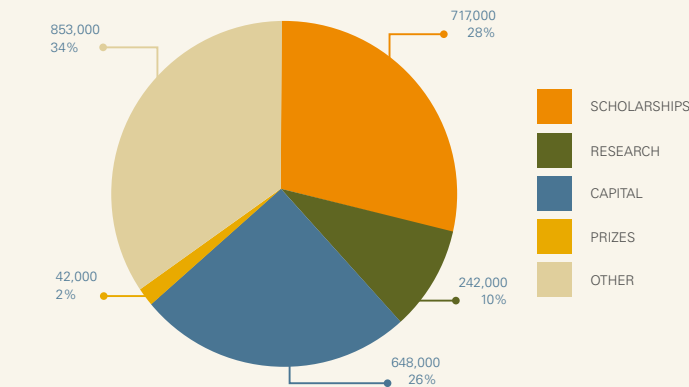
DISTRIBUTIONS TO SCHOLARSHIPS, RESEARCH ETC (\$000)



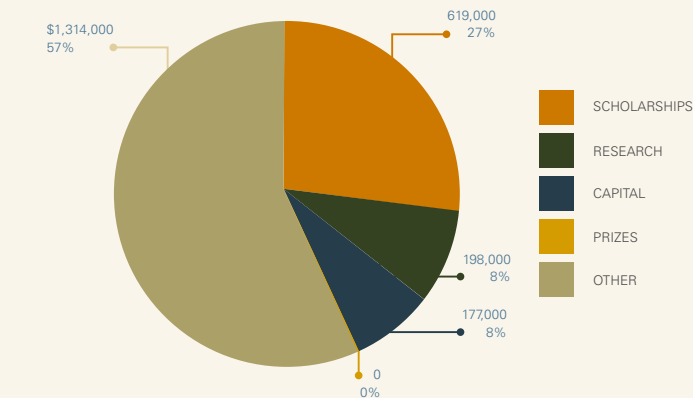
Scholarships and research remain a popular destination for gifts to the Foundation and 2016 was no exception, with nearly 40 per cent of gifts going to these two very important areas. Gifts to capital projects increased to 26 per cent in 2016 and were dominated by gifts to restore the Refectory building. Gifts to other areas include academic chairs.

Distributions were more than double the previous year's and were skewed slightly by one large distribution of \$1.44 million to the Wildbase Hospital build. Gifts to chairs and other areas increased to an impressive 28 per cent or \$884,000.

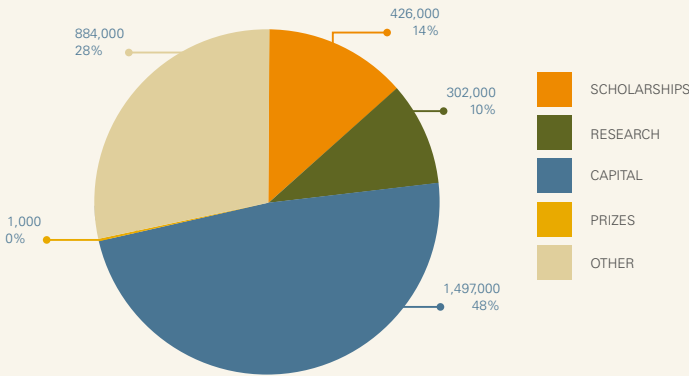
FUNDRAISING INCOME BY CATEGORY 2016



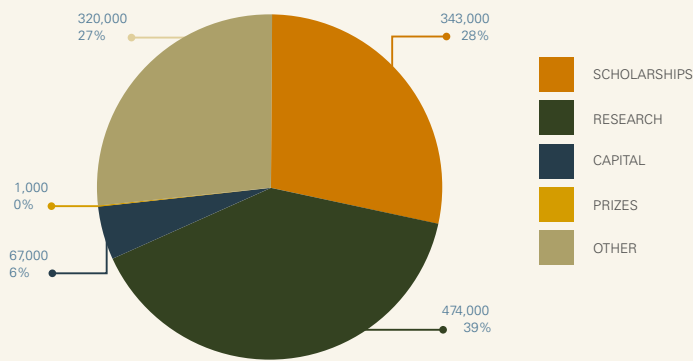
FUNDRAISING INCOME BY CATEGORY 2015

Independent Auditor's Report

To the readers of Massey University Foundation Trust's summary annual report for the year ended 31 December 2016

The summary annual report was derived from the annual report of the Massey University Foundation Trust (the Trust) for the year ended 31 December 2016. We have reviewed whether the summary annual report represents fairly and accurately the information regarding the major matters dealt with in the annual report.

The annual report included full audited statements, and the summary annual report includes summary statements. We have audited the following summary statements reported in the summary annual report on page 1:

- the summary statement of financial position as at 31 December 2016;
- the statement of the statement of comprehensive revenue and expense, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year ended 31 December 2016; and
- the notes to the summary financial statements that include accounting policies and other explanatory information.

We expressed an unmodified audit opinion on the Trust's annual report in our report dated 18 May 2017.

Opinion

Our opinion:

- the summary annual report represents fairly and consistently the information regarding the major matters dealt with in the annual report; and
- the summary statements comply with PBE FRS 103: Summary Financial Statements.

Basis of opinion

Our work was carried out in accordance with the Auditor-General's Auditing Standards, which incorporate the International Standards on Auditing (New Zealand), and in particular with the International Standard on Auditing (New Zealand) 810: Engagement to Report on Summary Financial Statements. These standards require us to carry out procedures to confirm whether the summary annual report contains the information necessary, and at an appropriate level of acquisition, to allow it to be understood.

The summary statements and the financial statements from which they were derived, do not reflect the effects of events that occurred subsequent to the report date (18 May 2017) on the full audited statements.

The summary statements do not contain all the disclosures required for full audited statements, and, generally, are prepared according to practice in New Zealand. Reading the summary statements, therefore, is not a substitute for reading the full audited statements in the annual report of the Trust.

Responsibilities of the Trustees and the Auditor

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the summary annual report so that it represents fairly and consistently the information regarding the major matters dealt with in the annual report. It includes preparing summary statements, in accordance with PBE FRS 103: Summary Financial Statements. The Trustees are also responsible for the publication of the summary annual report, whether in printed or electronic form.

We are responsible for expressing an opinion on whether the summary annual report represents fairly and consistently the information regarding the major matters dealt with in the annual report and whether the summary statements comply with PBE FRS 103: Summary Financial Statements.

Other than in our capacity as auditor we have no relationship with, or interest in, the Trust.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Massey University Foundation Trust (the 'Foundation') is domiciled in New Zealand and is a charitable trust for the benefit of Massey University. It has held charitable status since 2004. The Foundation has designated itself as a public benefit entity with all applicable public benefit entity exemptions being adopted.

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the trust deed, the Charities Act 2005, the Education Act 1989 – TEI Subsidiaries and New Zealand Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (NZ GAAP) where defined. The financial statements comply with Public Benefit Entity International Public Sector Accounting Standards (PBE IPSAS) and other applicable Financial Reporting Standards as appropriate for Tier 2 PBE entities. The Foundation qualifies as a Tier 2 reporting entity as it does not have public accountability and is not 'large' as defined by XRB A1.

The summary financial statements are for the year ended 31 December 2016 and have been prepared in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 43 Summary Financial Statements.

The financial statements have been prepared on an historical cost basis except for Managed Funds which have been measured at fair value.

The financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars and all values are rounded to the nearest thousand dollars (\$000). The functional currency of the Foundation is New Zealand dollars (NZ\$).

The accounting policies adopted in these financial statements are consistent with those of the previous financial year. For further details of these policies please see the Foundation's full financial statements.

The Foundation is a controlled entity of Massey University, as the Trustees of the Foundation are appointed by the Vice Chancellor of the University. All transactions between entities were conducted on an arm's length basis using commercial terms. Massey University paid and provided staffing, provision of buildings and equipment to the value of \$665,971 (2015 \$556,695).

AS AT 31 DECEMBER 2016

The summary financial statements were authorised by the Trustees on 18 May 2017. These summary financial statements have been extracted from the Foundation's full financial statements dated 18 May 2017. The full financial statements were prepared in accordance with GAAP. The Foundation has made an explicit and unreserved statement of compliance with PBE IPSAS in its full financial statements. The full financial statements were audited by Audit New Zealand who issued an unqualified audit opinion.

The summary financial statements provide interested persons with a succinct overview of the past performance of the Foundation. Users of the summary financial statements should note that the information contained therein cannot be expected to provide as complete an understanding as provided by the full financial statements.

Celebrating two decades of giving

Peter and Doris Macdonald, who have been providing scholarships to Wellington-based industrial design students for almost two decades through their charitable trust, handed over the funds to the Massey University Foundation in 2016 to continue their philanthropic work. The Macdonalds have gifted a generous sum of \$103,000 to establish an endowed fund in their name, ensuring longevity of their annual scholarship.

The Peter and Doris Macdonald Scholarship aims to advance the mechanical, scientific and practical aspects of industrial design in New Zealand by providing a scholarship each year to an industrial design student from Massey University's College of Creative Arts.

To mark the 20th year that the scholarship has been available, the college held a special event to award the 2016 scholarship. The event brought together past recipients of the award to recognise the role that the scholarship plays in advancing good industrial design in New Zealand and the lasting impact their generosity will have on future designers. Already, the scholarship has been a springboard to careers in design that have seen award recipients create everything from protective snowboard equipment, and kitchen designs for the disabled to collapsible crates and passenger plane interiors.

Mr Macdonald, a retired DSIR geophysicist, says he launched the scholarship in 1995 because he believed good design was a critical component in New Zealand's economic future. He wanted to bring together bright students and practical ideas. Although Peter and Doris started small by gifting small amounts each year to the fund to provide a scholarship, the impact of their gift and their commitment to philanthropy has grown over time, with Mr Macdonald intending to leave a bequest to the Massey University Foundation ensuring his and Doris' legacy and aspirations regarding good design get carried beyond their lives.



Foundation supports future health leaders

Late last year the Massey Foundation was delighted to sponsor 24 health professionals from some of the world's poorest countries to travel to Australia to attend the fourth International One Health EcoHealth Congress. The future health leaders - doctors and veterinarians from Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Bhutan and Nepal – were recent graduates of Massey's two-year One Health Epidemiology Fellowship Programme "Education into Action" funded by the European Union.

Money from the Foundation's Unrestricted Fund was gifted to the cohort to help cover their travel and conference costs. The five-day congress in Melbourne provided an invaluable opportunity for the fellows to present key results from the programme and to network with more than 1000 global health experts from 60 countries. Prior to the conference the fellows participated in a concluding workshop and short study tour in New Zealand, also partly funded by the Massey Foundation.

The One Health Fellowship Programme provides postgraduate education and applied training in epidemiology and biosecurity to health professionals in an effort to stem the spread of infectious diseases from animals to humans in developing countries. The aim of the programme is for veterinarians, doctors and wildlife experts to work together to improve national and global biosecurity and disease control policy.

Dr Peter Jolly, who leads the International Development Group in the Institute of Veterinary, Animal and Biomedical Sciences at Massey University and is responsible for Massey's One Health Fellowship Programme, says the opportunity to attend the congress and partake in the study tour was hugely beneficial for the fellows. "It was a timely opportunity for them to gain both distinctive New Zealand and global perspectives, and to be inspired by global health leaders and initiatives.

"Thanks to the generosity of the Foundation, these future health leaders are better able to face the enormous challenges confronting their homelands through such international exposure and collaboration."

The visit and conference was also supported by grants from the Morris Trust (also part of the Massey University Foundation) and The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.

The fellows took a break from the study tour to attend their Massey graduation ceremony in Palmerston North, where they were awarded master's degrees in Veterinary Medicine (for the vets) and in Public Health (for the medical doctors). It was a chance for the Massey One Health team to celebrate with the graduates and to recognise their hard work and dedication. This is the third One Health cohort to graduate through the University's master's degree programme, which now has 108 alumni from nine Asian countries.

Staff giving supports business students

The Massey Business School is paving the way for staff philanthropy by establishing a staff-funded student bursary for promising students. The inaugural Promising Students Assistance Bursaries were awarded to students in November. A total of \$15,000 was distributed to 10 Massey Business School students to cover course-related costs such as textbooks and travel expenses, or to assist with general living costs.

The bursaries came out of the Massey Business School Development Fund, which is one of the more popular funds for staff involved in the Foundation's Direct from Salary Giving (DSG) programme. There are currently 116 regular staff donors involved in the programme, donating directing from their salaries each fortnight to a variety of different funds.

The Massey Business School have an impressive number of staff donating to their Development Fund, contributing a total of \$1240 to the fund each month after match-funding from the University. To help grow the fund, the Massey Business School has also committed to match-funding staff donations.

The bursaries, which can be awarded to either an undergraduate or postgraduate student in any study mode, came about from staff members identifying a need for more assistance for students facing financial hardship.

Associate Professor Elizabeth Gray who heads the school's Development Fund Advisory Group says, "we know everyone faces challenges juggling study and life, but some people face more challenges than others. While study is not always easy to finance, it can be life-changing, so we wanted to offer something different to other scholarships, which are generally tied exclusively to academic prowess.

"Many of the bursary recipients have made direct contact to tell us about the real difference these funds will make as they continue on their educational pathway."

Massey Business School Pro Vice-Chancellor Professor Ted Zorn says he is proud of how staff in his school have chosen to use the funds and hopes to see staff support grow.

"It is my hope that, in future years, we can support a larger number of students and, in some cases, offer larger amounts of money. These bursaries are a perfect example of how small actions can have a big impact."

Sport management student Samantha-Jo Toohill says the bursary has made the difference between being able to afford petrol and missing classes. The single mother says she realised furthering her education was the key to a better future for herself and her two daughters.

"The bursary didn't just affect my life by assisting financially, there were intrinsic benefits too," she says. "I found a sense of pride in my situation and a boost in my confidence. It's definitely reflected at home with my kids. I feel more capable knowing there are people out there who want me to do well."

Similarly, communication student Leilani Baker credits the bursary with assisting her to be financially independent.

"My dad actually has an illness so it means he can't work strenuously and that puts a lot of financial strain on my mum who is a school teacher," she says. "The bursary is going to make a huge difference to me because I already have two part-time jobs...when I left home I kind of made the decision that I wanted to support myself."

Master of Economics student Bronwyn Bruce-Brand will use her bursary for something quite different – an overseas exchange at the University of Copenhagen.

"The bursary grant is hugely helpful – as most people would expect going overseas is pretty pricey and doing an exchange is no exception," she says.

"It's incredibly humbling to know that the staff have directly contributed from their salaries to make this bursary possible. Without this bursary it would pretty much be impossible to go overseas and do an exchange like this, and it's such a good experience for me."

Agriculture award celebrates 15 years

One of Massey agriculture's most valued prizes, the William Gerrish Memorial Award, reached a special milestone last year having been awarded to top Massey agricultural students for 15 years.

The annual prize was established in 2001, in memory of popular alumnus Bill Gerrish, through a generous annual donation made by Bill's wife Lesley and their six children.

Bill's family wanted the award to recognise an outstanding Massey student in farm management who also demonstrates many of the values that Bill had; intellectual curiosity, personal integrity, vision and social conscience.

Today the award symbolises prestige, integrity and academic excellence among the Massey community and is highly sought after by final year agricultural students.

The 2016 winner, and 15th recipient of the Gerrish Award, was third year Bachelor of AgriCommerce student Cameron Walker. Cameron was thrilled to receive the award, saying "it's great to have my hard work and dedication to agricultural studies recognised by such a prestigious award. It means a lot."

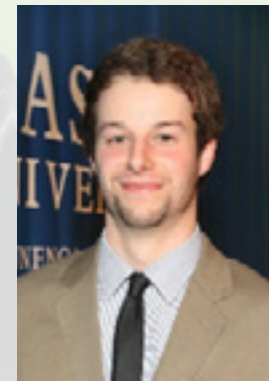
Cameron was raised on a small hobby farm just outside Palmerston North, which is where he developed his passion for agriculture. He held many leadership roles during secondary school and university including vice-chairman of the Massey Young Farmer's Club. The award selection committee described him as a deep thinker with a strong social conscience and a sharp understanding of agriculture and the challenges it faces.

He joins an impressive group of Gerrish award winners who have all gone on to have successful careers in agri-commerce and management. One of the earliest Gerrish prize recipients, Mark Julian, credits the award with the direction that his career took after graduation.

"Winning the award back in 2004 was huge for me as it rewarded both merit and leadership. It made me think carefully about my career choices and the monetary side of the award helped in my decision to return to Massey for my postgraduate year.

"In my first job out of university I had the option of going into consultancy for Dairy NZ or into one of the banks for a lot larger salary, and I guess thinking about Bill's career helped me choose the option of building on my leadership skills with Dairy NZ."

Mark is now general manager of dairy operations at Landcorp and, in 2013, he won the Young Executive of the Year award at the Deloitte Top 200 Business Awards. He still hopes to be involved in international rural development work later in his career, aspiring to follow in Bill's footsteps.

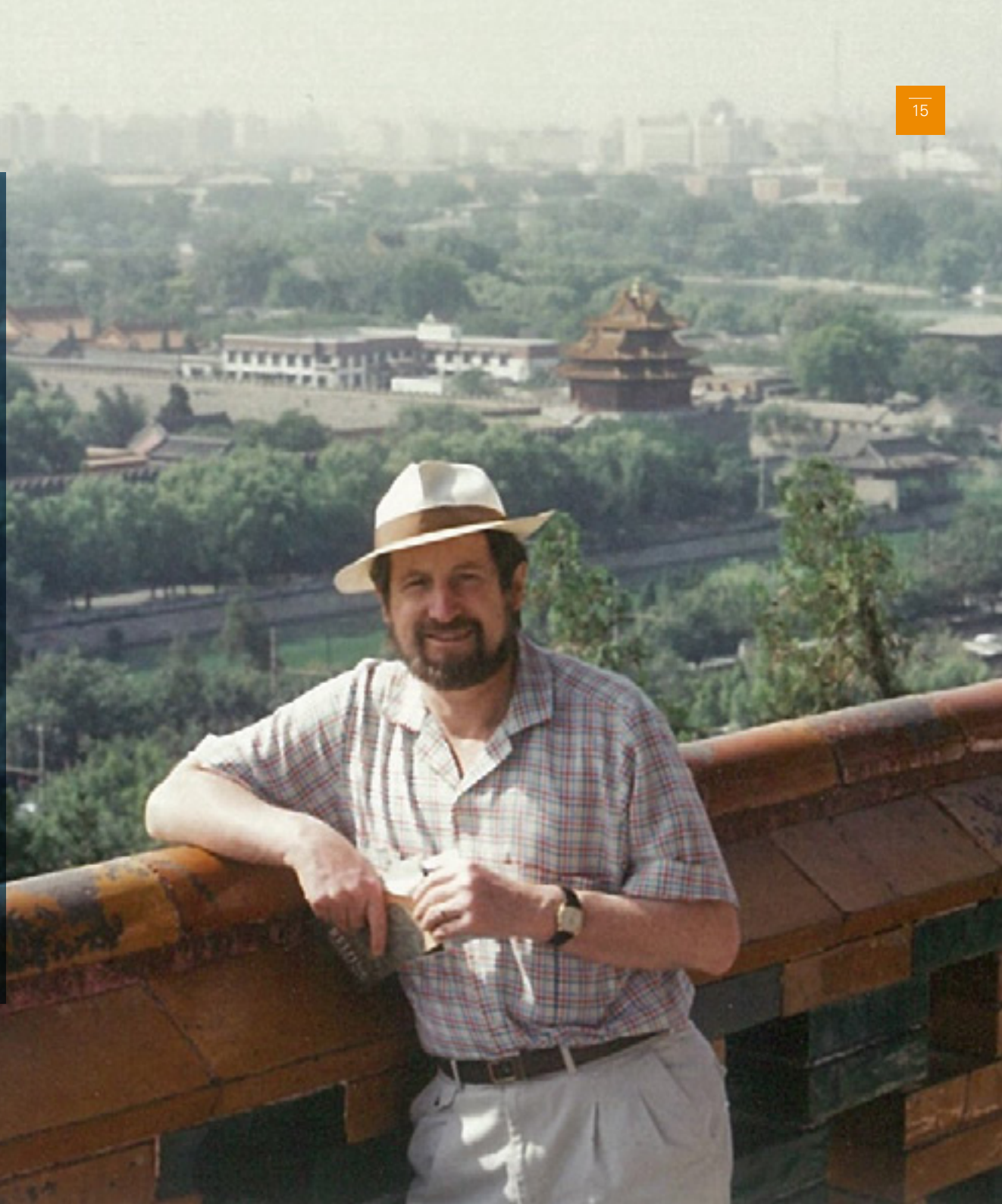

BILL GERRISH

The late Bill Gerrish arrived at Massey University in 1960 having been awarded a Victorian Department of Agriculture Scholarship to study agricultural science. He was one of 52 Victorians in the period 1948-72 to study at Massey under that programme. He completed his four-year degree, majoring in Agricultural Economics and Farm Management, and returned to Victoria as a Dairy Farm Extension Officer in early 1965.

During his time at Massey, he took the opportunity to interact with fellow international students, especially those from lesser-developed nations, many of whom were supported by the Colombo Plan. These interactions were to have a profound impact on him, resulting in a deep social conscience and a lifelong interest in agricultural development in the broader Asian Region and beyond.

After graduation, Bill went on to have a successful career as an agricultural consultant, taking part in development projects all over South East Asia and the Pacific. He also spent nearly 20 years working on projects in China, including the development of a livestock and pasture programme in the remote Nan Shan mountains. He always had a passion for helping those less fortunate in society and improving agriculture capabilities in under-developed nations. He had a remarkable impact on society during his lifetime and the William Gerrish Memorial Award continues his legacy by empowering young agriculture graduates to go on to contribute to society, just as he did.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships have the power to change lives. In 2016, the Foundation was proud to distribute \$426,000 in scholarships and bursaries to Massey students.

The financial support provided by these scholarships and bursaries can make a huge difference in the lives of students and their families. Yet, the affirmation of receiving a scholarship and the encouragement this brings can be even more powerful.

With government funding for students limited to a maximum of 200 weeks – after which students need to borrow money – many students struggle to support themselves through study without amassing mountains of debt. This especially impacts postgraduate students who are usually not entitled to a student allowance and tend to have additional financial responsibilities.

Assistant Vice-Chancellor Research, Academic and Enterprise Professor Giselle Byrnes is delighted with the Foundation's work delivering scholarships to Massey students and believes more support is needed for our master's and doctorate students.

"With the cost of living rising many postgraduate students are increasingly having to work while they study, which dramatically affects completion rates and results.

"I've seen first-hand the difference that a scholarship can make to a student's life, learning and well-being, particularly in driving their motivation levels and sense of self-belief. Often a scholarship can be the difference between graduating or not."

The Foundation offers several postgraduate-specific scholarships and aims to grow this number each year. Thank you to everyone who has established or donated to a scholarship fund in 2016, helping these students reach their potential.

"I'm a hardworking, committed kiwi student with one goal, which is to work in the toy industry creating toys that improve the quality of children's play. The grant helped me take the next step towards achieving my career dream and I'm extremely grateful for that. I am currently enrolled in a Master of Design investigating the hybridisation between digital media and physical play objects. I am specifically looking at how these 'phygital' play-objects can promote a healthier form of play in regards to what children learn or benefit from through play.

The grant allowed me to purchase research equipment, such as electronic and traditional play objects, for testing. I plan to donate these play objects to a children's charity at the end of my research project so they can be enjoyed as they were intended to be.

The grant also removed a tonne of financial pressure and allowed me to keep my current employment to just three days a week so I could spend the remainder of my time fully focused on my study.

Once I've finished my master's degree I see myself working in the toy industry designing mechanisms to improve the quality of children's play. My personal goal is to design and build a set of toys that accompany a children's book that I intend to write and illustrate myself.

"I'm currently based in Australia with my husband and three young boys studying part-time towards a conjoint Bachelor of Business (Property Valuation) and Bachelor of Science (Geography). Originally from South Africa, education was very important in our household and I always knew I wanted to go to university.

However, when my dad was forced to retire, our family went through very difficult times financially and I ended up completing high school by distance while working in real estate and running a small manufacturing business. When the recession hit us hard, my Kiwi husband and I decided to move to New Zealand, with our seven-month old son, to go dairy farming. I felt a bit lost starting over in a new country with a new baby so didn't pursue university study right away.

In 2015 my husband was offered a job on a farm in Australia so our family of five moved over the ditch. However, eight months later, and having already started my extramural study with Massey, half the business closed and my husband was made redundant.

After living in a tent for a few weeks with our three boys, my husband was fortunately offered another job. Though, it has meant a pay cut and financially things are very tight.

Despite the uncertainty and challenges, I was determined to keep studying because I've already waited so long and I feel like it is the only way to give our children a good, stable future. I also wanted to set an example to them of being committed to your goals. Without the bursary, this wouldn't have been possible. It helped me buy my textbooks for the year, paid for my overseas exam fees, bought a cheap laptop to study wherever we happened to be and it helped towards my internet costs for the year.

Studying with Massey has meant that even though 2016 was extremely challenging on many levels, I was still able to continue studying and achieve my best. I was really surprised and happy to make the Massey Business School's Dean's List for 2016. Thank you to the Massey Foundation and the Peter Collett Extramural Bursary for providing this huge assistance to me at a difficult time."
